This annual event, now in its 28th year, allows walkers to raise money through sponsorship for their favourite charities whilst enjoying a very interesting walk through some beautiful parts of the Berkshire countryside, re-tracing the old boundary of the ancient town of Maidenhead.

Each year Maidenhead Rotary Club assists hundreds of local residents to raise funds for their own charities and causes, raising on average £4,000 each year. Participants can do the walk just for fun or to help raise money for their own charities or in support

of Maidenhead Rotary Club's own charitable work.

It was great to be able to lend a hand at this superb event, not only on the day but also in advance giving advice on how to market the event and get more people involved.

A merry team of Maidenhead Rotaractors rose early on Sunday, 4th October to help with marshalling the route, selling refreshments and registering walkers. In total over 500 people took part and over £15,000 was raised for various local charities - the most participants for over 10 years!

Julia and Jess also went along for a couple of hours the weekend prior to the walk to lend a hand clearing the footpath near Boulters Lock and the river.



## DISTRICT PR WORKSHOP



The purpose of this seminar was to bring all the clubs in District 1090 together to talk about specific issues and practical ideas in relation to Rotaract membership and publicity.

**MICHAEL BRADFIELD** is 29 years of age, an Oxford graduate who now works as a paramedic with the London Ambulance Service.

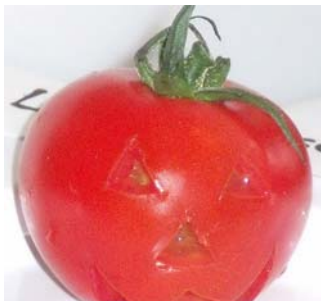
